Pastor's Article

On March 31, 1739, John Wesley arrived in Bristol. It was there that he found Reverend George Whitfield preaching outdoors to local coal miners. Wesley, whose training and custom dictated that preaching be done inside church buildings, was scandalized that a colleague would act so vile as to preach outdoors. Something happened in Bristol that changed Wesley's mind. Wesley began to preach as he had seen Whitfield preach, to the regular folk of Bristol, sans church building. In his journal he wrote that he "submitted to be more vile."

At the core of our Wesleyan heritage is an invitation to be vile. For Wesley it was vile to preach outdoors, yet he discovered that there was a gift in being willing to be vile. It was vile for women to be preachers, yet Wesley found that there was a gift in being vile. It was vile to oppose the enslavement of human beings, yet Wesley found that there was a gift in being vile. It was vile to split from the established church, yet Wesley found that there was a gift in being vile. Our Wesleyan heritage has been at its best when it has been at its vilest.

As we embark on a new year, we are going to be spending some time with John Wesley, with our vile heritage, and with an invitation that we too should submit to being more vile. Ashley Boggan, the General Secretary of the Commission on Archives and History, calls this Wesleyan Vile-tality – a reminder that our vitality as a people comes from our willingness to go where others won't, to welcome others reject, and to include those no one else wants to include. I hope that you will join me in committing to being vile this year as we continue to explore what it means to be called to ministry in times such as these.

This day invites congregations to strengthen communities, especially those facing poverty, injustice, or lack of opportunity. Update on Church Finances

Food for Thought

Synopsis of book “The Right Questions for Church Leaders” by Rev. Lovett H. Weems.

*Leaders do not need all the answers – they need the right questions
to guide people toward faithful discovery.*

Vision & Mission

1. What evidence do we have that our congregation understands and lives out our mission?
2. How is our mission statement shaping real decisions, not just words on paper?
3. What would our community lose if our church no longer existed?
4. What new opportunities is God opening before us right now?

Leadership and Governance

5. How do we currently identify, mentor, and empower emerging leaders?
6. Are leadership roles filled by calling and gifts – or by convenience and tradition?
7. What conversations are we not having as a leadership team that we need to have?
8. How do we handle conflict – and what does that say about our spiritual maturity?

Stewardship and Resources

9. How does our budget reflect our mission and priorities?
10. What portion of our resources goes to sustaining ourselves versus serving others?
11. How transparent are our financial decisions to the congregation?
12. What new forms of generosity might we be overlooking (time, skills, partnerships)?

Outreach and Growth

13. Who in our surrounding community is not being reached by our current ministries?
14. What barriers – physical, cultural, or spiritual – keep newcomers from connecting with us?
15. What partnerships in our community could multiply our impact?
16. How do we measure growth beyond attendance – such as discipleship, service, or transformation?

Change and Innovation

17. What practices or programs have “outlived their purpose” and need to be released?
18. How do we learn from failure without assigning blame?
19. What is one bold experiment we could try this year to serve in a new way?
20. How are we preparing ourselves spiritually and emotionally for change?

Congregation Creation Care Team

Oneonta-area residents are rightfully concerned about a potential AI data center. While these facilities demand enormous energy for cooling and can strain local grids, raising utility costs, the National Resources Defense Council (NRDC) argues AI expansion doesn't have to mean higher bills or environmental harm.

The Path Forward

The key lies in how tech companies power their operations. Clean energy sources like geothermal and nuclear power offer renewable alternatives to fossil fuels. Communities can leverage this moment by demanding Community Benefit Agreements (CBAs) before welcoming data centers. These agreements can secure:

- Lower taxes and utility bills
- Major investments in clean energy infrastructure
- Protection of air quality

According to the NRDC, "If renewable energy generation becomes the fastest option to get their centers up and running, tech companies have the potential to speed up the larger transition to clean energy."

Proven Solutions

Data center flexibility offers another tool. Texas already allows grid operators to pause data center operations during peak demand, preventing community blackouts. This model shows how collaboration between communities and tech companies can balance AI expansion with grid reliability and public health.

What You Can Do

As individuals: Make informed choices. ChatGPT uses 10 times more electricity than a standard Google search. While AI tools boost productivity, consider whether the energy cost justifies each use.

As community members: AI data centers are here to stay, and states are competing for them. We must demand proper community investment to keep emissions and costs low. Make your voice heard – consider it your New Year's resolution.
